## Greeting troops with a permanent tribute

troops come off the planes looking grim and tired. Then they see the Troop Greeters and their faces break into smiles.

Chuck Knowlton, with fellow Troop Greeter and co-chair of the capital campaign, Gil Cory, described the scene at Bangor International Airport that has been repeated hundreds of times since the greeters first gathered at 1991.

With flights arriving at anytime during the day and night, the greeters were ready to travel to the airport to greet the next flight.

Mr. Knowlton said that after 9/11, publication of the flight arrivals ceased, but the greeters continued to find out when the flights were on their way. Over the years, thousands of items have been donated by arriving soldierspatches, medals, even uniforms. The question arose: what to do with all this?

A Troop Greeters Museum at the airport will house as much of the memorabilia as space will permit. Mr.

Knowlton told of a fundraising effort to support the vision created in 2009 to build a museum in space near the ramp where troops disembark. The organization incorporated and received non-profit 501(c)3 status.

Mr. Knowlton began troop greeting nine years ago and became chairman of the group four years ago. Information from their website

(http://www.mainetroopgreetersmuseum.org/) reports that since 2003, the Maine Troop Greeters have welcomed over 1.5 million Troops either going overseas or returning from duty at Bangor International Airport. These greetings have resulted in a collection of memorabilia consisting of over 5,000 challenge coins, 1,000+ patches, 500+ dog tags, flags, banners and many letters of gratitude. The museum will ensure that these items are displayed and preserved for all to appreciate.

The museum, designed to be 80'x14', plans to be opened on November 11, 2017.
