Youth in Government Learn How It Works. Or Doesn't.

hree young women wrote bills, argued in their favor and saw them pass – or fail – during the recent YMCA-sponsored "Youth in Government – Legislative, Judicial, Media" conference in Augusta. Ellie MacMillan, Zoe Ellingwood and Mackenzie Thompson described, during Thursday's meeting, the legislative process they learned as they practiced with other

students in the roles of legislators and committees.

The three-day conference worked within the guidelines of a mock government, with all parts of the government represented. Ms. MacMillan, a junior at Bangor High School, served on the Criminal Justice Committee that was able to get five of seven of



their bills passed.

The trio learned about "left" and "right" and the challenges such leanings present to legislators. Ms. Thompson, a senior at BHS, responded to a question about the current college admissions scandal saying that parents need to let their children take charge of their own lives. "The parent who is a doctor will force his or her child into attending medical school when they may want to do something else," she said.



Ms. Thompson wrote two bills, one of which caused controversy among the 200 attendees. She proposed establishing a sanctuary in Lewiston and the county for

immigrants. The bill did not pass, but it was nominated in the "best bill" category. Another bill that did pass proposed banning smoking in cars in which there are young children passengers.

Responding to a question about "Civics" courses and if they still exist, Ms. Ellingwood, a senior at Hampden Academy, said that those students interested in



government can go outside the school, as the Youth in Government group did, to learn about democracy.

The trio gained a quick immersion experience in fundraising, collecting \$700 in five days. "We are going to start fundraising now for next year," Ms. Thompson said.

Overall, 100 bills were submitted. One of them proposed building a 90-foot high Santa in Aroostook County. It passed.
